Principal's Report

National developments

Ireland remains one of the lowest investing countries in education in the OECD, despite being one of the wealthiest countries. It is widely acknowledged that a great deal of our economic success is due to good educational provision in the past, despite the poor investment. With the appointment of a new Minister for Education & Science, Ms Mary Hanafin T.D., it is essential that the government give immediate priority to investing in the future wellbeing of our country. Even in the general provision of teachers to schools, we remain far worse off than we were in the 1980s and it is time that position was remedied with a general drop in the pupil-teacher ratio back to the level of the 1980s, when the ratio was 15:1 instead of the present 18:1, as recommended by the McGuinness report into teacher allocations. The same report recommends that there should be a guidance counsellor for every 400 pupils, instead of the current 800. Such reports should not just gather dust! Schools like ours have also been promised state funded chaplains for many years but no resources have been provided to enable us to appoint them.

As always, the government has embarked on some worthy programmes and legislation in recent years and months. The passing of the Education for Persons with Special Educational Needs Act 2004, although not a full rights based law, has gone a long way to ensuring that the needs of the most vulnerable students in the country will be better catered for in the future. The Act has established the National Council for Special Education (NCSE) which has appointed a team of Special Education Needs Organisers (SENO) to work with individual schools to ensure that they are equipped with the resources to cater for students with special needs, although there are caveats pointing out that such resources are limited. Experience will show how effective the service is and, more importantly, how well resourced it is.

The National Education Welfare Board, established under the terms of the Education Welfare Act, remains grossly underfunded and is unable to fulfil its remit of ensuring that students attend school regularly and obtain their full entitlement of educational provision. While the board is doing its best with its meagre resources and is quite correctly targeting disadvantaged areas first, it is a political decision that is depriving it of the funds it badly needs.

I am pleased to report that some of the problems which were experienced in the early years of the National Educational Psychological Service have been ironed out and that it is becoming easier to access educational assessments. However, there is still no programme of nationally provided psychological support for troubled teenagers, except through the health service where there is usually a waiting list of more than six months. With the greatly increased stresses which the nature of modern society places on teenagers, this must surely be a priority in any caring country.

After a decade of lack of progress, the Teachers' Council is at last being established. This body will act in similar ways to the Medical Council and will supervise the teaching profession, registering qualifications, providing for professional development and standards, regulating quality control in the profession and providing support for teachers with welfare problems. Elections for the body will take place shortly.

The national broadband programme for schools was announced with great fanfare in May 2004. The purpose of the programme is to provide broadband connections to the internet to all schools and to assist them with networking their buildings so that access is available throughout the school. The use of a variety of technologies to provide for every type and location of school is proposed. Such a development is welcome but there must unfortunately be a cautionary note. This school has had a broadband connection and a network for many years and it is interesting that the specifications being proposed for national implementation are a quarter of the speed we currently provide, which would be completely inadequate. The level of financing being offered for networking is also about a quarter of what it actually costs to provide a network. There is no provision being offered for employing an ICT coordinator or technical support staff. The main reason for the success of our ICT development at The High School is that we make a large investment in such provision and we are lucky to have half a dozen members of staff on the ICT team who are willing to contribute their skills and energy. One wonders where schools which do not charge fees are to obtain the remainder of the finance - from cake sales?

The broadband programme is also supposed to provide an enclosed virtual learning environment, in other words a website with links to lesson plans, pupil resources, other interesting websites, safe e-mail facilities for students, information for staff, parents and managers, as well as centrally managed services such as anti-spam and anti-virus filters. All schools would welcome such a system, provided that it is comprehensive and professional in its approach. The development will require a large, permanent staff at the National Centre for Technology in Education (NCTE) if it is to succeed. Sadly, such good ideas are very rarely properly resourced in this country and the first thing I would like to see is a business and strategic plan published nationally, with guaranteed and specified funding over a realistic period of perhaps fifteen years. NCTE has operated such a portal website for many years (www.scoilnet.ie) but a casual visit is enough to see that it still has very little material available.

School developments

School review, evaluation, planning and development take place on a continuous basis, both formally and informally. The staff training day last November established three staff task groups to work on development plans for student learning needs, rights and responsibilities and staff professional development. These groups are proceeding with their work as part of the continuing review of the School Plan, a collection of documents required by the Education Act. Currently, new policies are being developed for guidance and special needs while our information and communications technology policy is being reviewed. A very favourable report on the Irish department was made by visiting inspectors towards the end of the last school year.

The work of the committees of the Board of Governors is also a vital part of the long term planning processes undertaken in the school. Staff and parents are represented on all Board sub-committees and have made valuable contributions to the work of the Management Committee, Finance Committee, Education Committee, Grounds and Property Committee and Sports Committee. So much work is undertaken by the Board committees that it can not be listed here, but one example is the ongoing refurbishment and buildings development work undertaken by the Grounds and Property Committee. There have been some major changes in the buildings during the summer, with two of our five laboratories being completely rebuilt and refitted. This is phase one of a programme which will see all of the laboratories rebuilt over the next few years. There was a lot of work completed in the Information and Communication Technology area, too. Twenty eight new PCs were installed in the ICT department and the network software serving the whole school was updated to the latest standard. In addition, some new areas of the school are being networked using a combination of wired and wireless technology to provide banks of computers for specific use in guidance and learning support. Individual PCs and data projectors are being provided in some of the classrooms as part of our continuous expansion of ICT provision. We plan to complete the networking of every room in the school during the coming year. A new learning support room has been provided which will facilitate small group and individual work. Our thanks are due to Administrator Mr J. Davis, Chairman of the Grounds & Property committee Dr J. Reid and the team who supported their efforts. It is seldom understood that the time between the end of the Leaving Certificate and the opening of term is a very short slot in which to achieve major work of this kind. Parents will be glad to hear that all of the above work was completed on time, to budget and from within planned school resources, so there will be no need for fund raising, due to the excellent planning of the Finance Committee, chaired by Mr S. Mason. The Education Committee, under the chairmanship of Mr D. Meredith, coordinated the work of the school planning task groups and the arrangements for staff training. It was decided to introduce Classical Studies in the junior cycle and to phase out the teaching of Latin. The Sports Committee, chaired by Mr R. Meates, continued to monitor the implementation of the sporting programme and philosophy of the school. All of these committees report to the Management Committee of the Board of Governors, chaired by Mr F. Sowman.

The school council is a very valuable body which is elected directly by all of the pupils, conducts its own meetings and then meets with the school management and staff representatives in order to ensure that pupils have the opportunity to contribute to school planning and processes. Last year, the issues covered included uniform, sport, maintenance, lockers, changing rooms, the school bus and school council communications.

The Guidance Department is run by Ms T. Jones, a qualified guidance counsellor. There is a guidance course offered in Forms 4 and 5 and individual career interviews with the guidance counsellor for pupils in Form 6. Pupils in Form 5 also have individual interviews with Mr A. Kelly to focus their attention on preparation for third level applications. Form 4 pupils undertake differential aptitude tests and interest inventories to assist them to make subject choices for the Leaving Certificate. They also study the operation of third level education and the opportunities available. Students are encour-

aged to begin thinking about potential career areas, to use work experience as a time to focus on future pathways, to consider possible college applications and to prepare accordingly. Students in Form 5 attend a variety of career talks held in the school, carry out a career project, visit UCD open day and familiarise themselves with relevant college websites and career related computer programs such as Qualifax. Students are also advised on curriculum vitae, job applications and interview technique. We are grateful to the Parents' Association for its assistance with the organisation of a mock interview evening. Mr McClure organises a study technique course for Form 5. Form 6 students have the opportunity to attend the Higher Options Career Exhibition, the TCD open day as well as to select other college open days of particular interest to individuals. For the parents of Form 6 there is an evening set aside in December where applications systems for all colleges are explained. The guidance counsellor is available to parents and pupils by prior appointment for career and psychological advice.

Our programme of visiting clergy and speakers to morning assembly continues to be successful. We are very grateful to the dozens of speakers who agreed to visit us. Pupils, staff and the Principal also participate. Our assembly programme is designed to provide an opportunity when the whole school can reflect on spiritual, moral, social and ethical themes. In addition, we celebrate the achievements of individual pupils and teams by congratulating them in assembly. It is an important vehicle for assisting the development of pupils' characters and values.

The contribution of the Parents' Association to the school is greatly appreciated. We are fortunate to have one of the most active associations of any school. Members now (among other things) assist the Guidance Department with mock interviews, hold talks on suitable topics with visiting speakers, facilitate the parties which are held to celebrate the graduation of Form 6 and the receipt of Junior Certificate results by Form 4, organise the parent-teacher meetings in Forms 1, 2 and 5, meet with the Principal and Chairman of the Board to discuss school policies, organise evening meetings for parents on educational themes, fund some of the prizes as well as grants for foreign exchanges, and represent the parents on all Board committees and ad hoc committees. This work brings the parents, pupils and staff closer together and such a vibrant and enthusiastic association is a testament to the strong ongoing support for the school among parents. The Association has recently purchased a new computer system which will assist with the running of the parent-teacher meetings.

The school is grateful to the Past Pupils' Union for its continued financial support, through prizes and bursaries as well as special fund-raising projects. Although much of this work is unseen, it is certainly appreciated. An online network exists on the school website at www.highschool dublin.com so that past pupils can register their e-mail addresses by year of graduation, thus keeping in touch with their peers and enabling the school to keep in touch with them. This year the Union held a wine tasting evening, a talk on China, carol singing, a talk on the archives of the Erasmus Smith Trust and the school, a cookery demonstration and two dinners.

Staff

We are sad to see four of our longest serving teachers retiring this year, but would like to thank them for their enormous contribution and wish them and their families the very best in the future.

Mr R. Miller taught here since 1963. He taught Greek, Latin, Classical Studies and Business. In addition, Mr Miller has been the school Guidance Counsellor running a comprehensive careers course, a Form Teacher, Year Head and in charge of the arrangements for scholarships.

Mrs D. Larkin taught general subjects in the junior school (of which she was Headmistress) and Art in the senior school since 1979. She has been co-ordinator of the Art Department and Transition Year Co-ordinator since the inception of the programme.

Mr J. Toomey taught Chemistry, Biology and Science since 1970 and has also served as a Form Teacher, Year Head and Co-ordinator of the Science Department. He made a large contribution to the coaching of athletics.

Mrs M. Dowsett taught Biology, Chemistry, Science and Health Education since 1980 and also served for many years as a Form Teacher.

We would also like to send our good wishes with Ms C. Ritchie who is beginning a career break this year and with Ms O'Sullivan, Ms Phelan, Mrs Bena Hanly and Ms Watson who have left us.

We welcome as new staff Mr P. McCaughey – Classical Studies, RE, History, Games; Mr L. McBride – Biology, Science, Maths, Games; Dr C. Whitford – Science, Chemistry, Biology; Ms H. Killane – Art, Technical Graphics, Photography, Portfolio; Ms N. Boyce – French; Ms K. Cramp – Economics, Business, Accountancy; Mr M. Sweetnam – English, Maths; Ms S. Brennan – resource teacher, Ms E. Delaney – special needs assistant; Mr J. Egan – supervisor.

Numbers and Examinations

The number of pupils enrolled in the school for the year 2004-2005 is 782. In the Leaving Certificate Examination, 2004, 115 pupils presented 803 papers in 21 subjects. 507 papers were taken at higher level and grade C or better was obtained in 80% of these. Grade E or less was obtained on 1.74% of all papers. These results are among the best the school has ever had.

In the Junior Certificate, 134 pupils presented 1108 papers. 901 papers were taken at higher level and grade C or better was obtained in 87% of these. Grade E or less was obtained on 1% of all papers. When the number of papers gaining a grade C or better at higher level is taken as a percentage of the total number of papers, it (71%) represents the best set of Junior Certificate results the school has ever had, beating our previous best of last year.

Events and Activities

The multitudinous events and activities of the school are now reported weekly in our school newsletter. The same information is published on the school website at www.highschooldublin.com where all of the weekly news pages for the last few years may be viewed. More detail on all school activities is available in our yearbook, The Erasmian and Diocesan Times, an excellent publication which is produced by Form 5 pupils. I would like to congratulate and thank the many staff who give up their time to encourage so many enthusiastic pupils in their pursuit of extra-curricular activities. These experiences add greatly to the enrichment of the pupils' education.
